Hospital Athletic Trainers Help Keep Athletes Safe

trainers across America are being recognized for their commitment to helping people prevent injuries and stay healthy and active. Athletic trainers are healthcare professionals who are highly educated and are often found working in high schools, colleges, professional sports, hospitals and medical offices.

Since 2001 the Sports program Medicine at LeConte Medical Center has provided certified athletic trainers who are medically licensed healthcare providers to cover all sports at Sevier County's high schools. LeConte Sports Medicine coordinates the athletic healthcare for students, providing comprehensive onsite services for Gatlinburg-Pittman High School, Pigeon Forge High School, Seymour High School, Sevier County High School, and Northview Academy. LeConte's certified athletic trainers offer prevention, evaluation and immediate care of sportsrelated injuries. The certified athletic trainers can brace, tape, or strap to protect and enable movement; administer first aid, and give CPR, as well as providing emergency care.

In October 2014 LeConte Medical Center was pleased to expand athletic training services into neighboring Cocke County, providing certified athletic trainers at Cosby High School and Cocke County High School.

LeConte Sports Medicine coordinator Scott Byrd, ATC, LAT, said, "LeConte Sports Medicine continues to be a leader in our field because our staff is driven to create a safer sports environment for our student athletes.
